Attack on the Pequot Fort

THANKSGIVING ORIGINATING FROM MASSACRE?

DURING THE PEQUOT WAR, ENGLISH CAPTAIN JOHN MASON ATTACKS A PEQUOT VILLAGE IN CONNECTICUT, **BURNING OR MASSACRING SOME** 500 NATIVE AMERICAN WOMEN, MEN AND CHILDREN.

On May 26, 1637 an army marched on the Pequot village at Mystic, slaughtering all but a handful of its inhabitants.

On June 5, Captain Mason attacked another Pequot village and again the Native inhabitants were massacred.

On July 28, a third attack and massacre occurred, and the Pequot War came to an end. Most of the surviving Pequot were sold into slavery.

THEIR SUPPORT WAS
FOLLOWED BY YEARS OF
SLOW, UNFOLDING
GENOCIDE OF THEIR
PEOPLE AND STEALING OF
THEIR LAND.


THE TRUTH IS

Some Native People choose to participate in the holiday. Giving thanks, coming together in ceremony and celebrating harvests are traditions our people have practiced since time immemorial and thus do not depend on a national Holiday.

FOR OTHER NATIVE PEOPLE, THANKSGIVING IS A REMINDER OF THE GENOCIDE OF MILLIONS OF NATIVE PEOPLE, THE THEFT OF NATIVE LANDS, AND THE RELENTLESS ASSAULT ON NATIVE CULTURE THAT CONTINUES TODAY. BECAUSE OF THIS IT IS NOT A DAY TO BE CELEBRATED AND IS NOT RECOGNIZED **OR** IS REMEMBERED AS A DAY OF MOURNING.

Blood Quantum

How much "Native blood" a person has by tracing individual and group ancestry.

The blood quantum policy was first implemented by the federal government within tribes to limit Native citizenship and Rights

Federally Recognized

American Indian or Alaska Native tribal entity that is recognized as having a government-togovernment relationship with the United States

Does any other Ethnicity or Race have to enroll to be a member of their own Ethnicity or Race?


